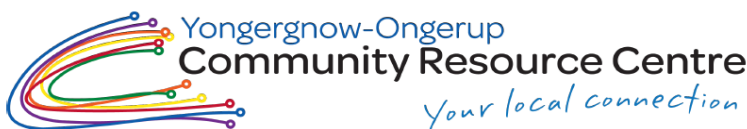

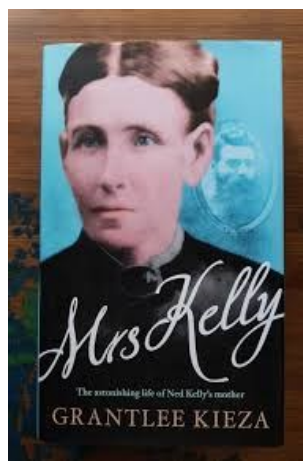
The mission is to create a space for all women in these districts to go to when they need a friend or feel they don't fit any other niche. We all want to rebuild previously broken relationships between these districts and form a stronger bond that will take us into the future. From the meeting we all learnt that we are after the same thing and a lot of the girls who attended said they came to meet new people. This space will become somewhere that women who move to any of the towns knowing no one can go and meet people. Women from the city may come down and realise the difficulty we face over the busy farming seasons and come to us knowing they have someone who understands. We are all at the other end of the phone line or a half hour drive from a friendly face and a cup of coffee.

Through the CWA we will be holding onto all of the past traditional values and strengths whilst creating our own flair through modern technologies and ideas. We are all about changing preconceived notions of what the CWA has always been through fresh ideas and an involving a younger generation. The aim will be to come away from each meeting having learnt something, whether it is from each other or via guest speaker. There are ideas for crafty lessons, cooking workshops, wine and cheese nights, mental and physical health workshops, basic practicality skills (using a drill to put up a picture, changing a gas bottle etc.) and many more exciting things. By the end of this there were a lot of thoroughly enthusiastic women and everyone had someone they want to bring along to the next one. Those present were keen to commit and so the inaugural AGM for the Stirling Branch was held after dinner. Office bearers were elected, Dimity McMorran – President, Olivia Letter – Vice President, Louise Bailey – Secretary and Rebecca Brady – Treasurer.

It was a wonderful evening of gaining friendships and sharing ideas. The invitation for the next meeting is wholeheartedly extended to everyone wanting to find a place in their community or those who couldn't make it. We want to welcome women of all ages, cultures, and walks of life to become a member. We want everyone to remember that we aren't here just for tea and scones; we want to make a difference.

BOOK CLUB REVIEW FOR APRIL 2018.

MRS KELLY BY GRANTLEE KIEZA. HELD AT MAY SCLATERS SUNDAY 8TH APRIL.



While we know much about the iconic outlaw Ned Kelly, his mother Ellen Kelly has been largely overlooked by Australian writers and historians - until now, with this vivid and compelling portrait by Grantlee Kieza, one of Australia's most popular biographers.

When Ned Kelly's mother, Ellen, arrived in Melbourne in 1841 aged nine, British convict ships were still dumping their unhappy cargo in what was then known as the colony of New South Wales. By the time she died aged ninety-one in 1923, having outlived seven of her twelve children, motor cars plied the highway near her bush home north of Melbourne, and Australia was a modern, sovereign nation.

Like so many pioneering women, Ellen, the wife of a convict, led a life of great hardship. Born in Ireland during a time of entrenched poverty and sectarian violence, she was a mother of seven when her husband died after months in a police lock-up. She lived through famine and drought, watched her babies die, listened through the prison wall while her eldest son was hanged and saw the charred remains of another of her children who'd died in a shoot-out with police. One son became Australia's most infamous (and ultimately most celebrated) outlaw; another became a highly decorated policeman, an honorary member of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and a worldwide star on the rodeo circuit. Through it all, 'the notorious Mrs Kelly', as she was dubbed by Victoria's Assistant Police Commissioner, survived as best she could, like so many pioneering women of the time.

By bestselling biographer Grantlee Kieza, *Mrs Kelly* is the astonishing story of one of Australia's most notorious women and her wild family, but it's also the story of the making of Australia, from struggling colony and backwater to modern nation.

As May was keen to show off her garden and deck we held our April book club on a Sunday for lunch.

So with the weather behaving and turning on a great day Tina, Marnie, Judy Mel, Brodie Roz Sandy and Gail rocked up to May's all toting a bottle of Champagne. There were two apologies from Brooke and Leanne.
